

It was with great excitement that school captains, Bella Leane, Jack Spooner and I headed to Tony Pasin, MP's, office on Monday 15th May to meet the Prime Minister! Along with the student leaders from all of the secondary schools in the region, Jack and Bella had the opportunity to ask our nation's leader a variety of questions about his role and the advice he could give them. The Prime Minister spoke about the importance of communication, character and conviction in leadership and it was clear that the young people were very interested in his perspective of what a good leader should be. In turn, student leaders from all schools were able to articulate why they had taken on the role that they had and what they hoped to achieve. PHYSICS

On Friday the 12th of May (Week 2), Mr Zadow's Year 11 Physics class had the opportunity to attend and participate in a practical at the UniSA, Mount Gambier Campus. The workshop provided the students with an opportunity to work with University professionals and develop their practical skills in more unfamiliar surroundings. The students were able to utilize and apply their understanding of the 'Waves' topic which was covered in the first term.

The students' first task was to determine the speed of sound experimentally by reflecting a sound wave off an object, and for different distances, determining the speed. They also were able to use equipment provided by UniSA to investigate the Doppler Effect. This practical experience provided the students with valuable insight into how experiments are conducted at a higher level.

LEGAL STUDIES

On Wednesday 17th May 2017, Legal Studies students from Grant High School participated in an excursion to the: South Australian Parliament, Old Adelaide Goal, Government House and Magistrates and Supreme Courts in Adelaide.

Under the guidance of Mr. Travis Clarke and Mrs. Judith Praolini, 17 students gained a valuable insight into the structure and functions of these legal institutions, which will assist their studies no end. The students were given an overview of the courts, and witness some very captivating live cases being heard. They learnt a great deal about how the courts function and this put into place what they had covered in the classroom. A tour of the parliament was then given by local MP, the Hon Troy Bell which proved very popular with the students.

Later in the day we were given a tour of Government House and we were fortunate to meet his Excellency the Hon Hiey Van Le AC, 35th Governor of South Australia. His Excellency spoke of the role of the Governor and the history of the impressive Government House, private residence of every Governor since 1840.

The office of Governor is non-political and quite distinct from that of elected head of the government (the Premier). Essentially, the

Governor's role is to follow the Constitution's requirements by securing the orderly transition from one government to the next and facilitating the work of Parliament and the government. Specific functions include summoning and dissolving Parliament, calling elections, appointing a Premier and a ministry, assenting to legislation and approving regulations and appointments.

There have been many royal visitors to the house including her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, King Edward VII, and King George V to name but a few. The students also inquired about past Governors on their tour around the beautiful Government House and immaculately kept grounds.

Later we finished of a fantastic day with a night tour of the Old Adelaide Goal.

The group was absolutely fantastic for the whole trip, and learnt a lot from the day. We are already planning to allow students from Grant High School the opportunity to visit the courts, Parliament, Government House and the Old Adelaide Goal again next year as part of the Legal Studies course.

SCRATCH DAY


Grant High School shared their passion for computer programming and higher order thinking skills when students from a range of local primary schools visited on **Friday 12th May**. The students have recently been extended in their Information Technology learning by undertaking computer programming using Scratch, a programming language that makes it easy to create your own interactive stories, animations, games, music, and art. Grant High School students have also been able to share their creations on the web.

As young people create projects in Scratch, they learn many of the skills that will be critical to their future success: thinking creatively, communicating clearly, analysing systematically, using technologies fluently, collaborating effectively, and learning continuously.

Scratch is particularly intended for 8-16 year-olds, but younger children can work on Scratch projects with their parents or older siblings, and university students use Scratch in some introductory Computer Science classes.

Scratch proves that tackling the hard stuff like Computer Science can be fun and worth doing. Grant High School is promoting this activity for Year 6 and 7 students who need extending and will be able to take the skills they acquire back to their respective schools and help other students have fun with this thinking. The event was held in the Grant High School Computer Room the morning was used to learn Scratch skills and to complete a number of different challenges, while the shorter afternoon session involved helping students meeting some Google Engineers via a video link and allowing students to learn about possible career pathways.

RAP PRESENTATION

On Wednesday of Week 2 the Year 11s attended the Road Awareness Program Presentation run by the Metropolitan Fire Service of SA. The students were presented with highly significant content involving road safety. Brad Ryan and his guest speaker, Udhi, took the time to show the sometimes horrific consequences of taking risks on the road. In 2016 alone the DPTI Road Crash Database recorded 86 fatalities and 605 serious injury crashes, which shows just how important this issue is, especially for our young people. Many students have said that they found the presentation very moving and important. By the end of the session all students had decided that they wanted to be more responsible on the roads. This presentation was a reminder to all those who watched it to make responsible decisions, as we can never anticipate the consequences of our behaviour.

GHS LAUNCHES 2017 MUSICAL SPECTRUM




