

RECONCILIATION WEEK

2017 National Reconciliation Week marked several historic events including the 50th Anniversary of the 1967 Referendum, the 25th Anniversary of the Mabo Decision and the 20th Anniversary of the Bringing Them Home Report.

Grant High School took the next steps in reconciliation by launching the site's first Reconciliation Action Plan at a whole-school assembly. This document is a formal statement of commitment to reconciliation. The following Visition Statement was read out to the whole school at the launch of Grant High School's Reconciliation Action Plan:

At Grant High School we are committed to creating a learning environment that actively builds and develops strong relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, and non-Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

We are committed to supporting our students to be informed and active citizens who understand Australian history and who are equipped to move forward with compassion and dignity.

We are committed to supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander individuals, organisations and communities, and respect the knowledges and perspectives held.

The ceremony began with the immersive sounds of yidakis being played by Amos Wilson and Warren Weetra, with acoustic accompaniment by Darcy Collins and Byron Sawley.

The following Acknowledgement of Country was read by Year 8 student Ethan Phelps:

We recognise Grant High School is located on the Country of the Boandik, the Traditional Custodians of Mount Gambier and the Country around Mount Gambier.

We also acknowledge the neighbouring Countries of the Ngarrindjeri, Bindjali and Gunditjmara peoples. We honour and respect our community members and Elders past and present as we move forward together with shared knowledge and understanding.

Idea statements for how Grant High School can take the next steps forward in reconciliation were collected from staff and students and transformed into a collaborative art work, which was unveiled at the assembly and will be hung permanently on the stairwell.

Many thanks to the wonderful Reconciliation Working Group for their support with the Reconciliation Action Plan development, the staff and students for their contributions to the collaborative mural and to the following guests who came to celebrate the launch: Adam Box, Robyn Campbell, Linda Clayton, Uncle Ken Jones and Janine Milsop.





Senior School Exam Guidelines

Attendance at Stage 1 exams is compulsory.

If students are absent from exams with a suitable explanation and make contact with the school either prior to or on the day of the exam, then alternative arrangements will be made to re-sit the exam. If no contact is made with the school as outlined above then students will receive a zero mark, which will then be recorded on semester reports.

Students must sign-in to school as they arrive and sign-out of school as they leave each day.

- Subject teachers will call home and notify parents/caregivers when students do not attend exams.
- All candidates sitting exams should be in school uniform.
- Mobile phones are not to be taken into exams. They cannot be used as calculators or timers.
- MP3 players or electronic dictionaries are not to be taken into exams.
- Candidates are allowed and encouraged to bring water or other non-carbonated drinks to the exam.
- Candidates who require extra materials can gain the invigilator's attention by raising a hand.
- Candidates must ask the invigilator for permission before getting up from their seats for any reason.
- Candidates are not permitted to write in their script books nor use their calculators during reading time. They may write on the scribbling paper provided.
- Candidates will not be permitted to leave exams during the first 30 minutes (after reading time) or the final 15 minutes.
- Candidates are to leave their script books/exams on their tables for the invigilator to collect.
- At the conclusion of the exam, candidates should place any paper in the recycling bins provided and other rubbish in the bin.

All students need to wait at the corridor end of the double doors at least 15 minutes prior to exam start time.

High school is full of choices. Choices about friends, subjects and pathways. It can get overwhelming. It can be helpful to know about how other people have gone with making decisions about their schooling and their futures.

My name is Caitlin I am currently studying year 12 at TAFE, to become a disability carer. I started TAFE last year in term 3, and it has been such a great experience to learn all sorts of information about disabilities and supports. I've always wanted to work with people with disabilities ever since I was a little girl. Growing up with two siblings who have disabilities meant that I really found the passion to become a disability carer. My brother Brodie Jack wasn't born with a disability but later started having seizures at just 6 months old. He then was diagnosed with cerebral palsy then it got worse and worse until he was around 8 then he stopped having seizures. Brodie was a happy little boy who always laughed at everything and was such a smiley little boy. Although he could not walk or talk he was

good at rolling around the house when he wasn't in his wheelchair. Brodie passed away nearly 2 years ago but he will forever be in our hearts <3 <3. My big sister Jessica was born with epilepsy; she has seizures and an intellectual disability but she's pretty cool. Jessica now has a boyfriend and they have a 7 month old daughter together who is just adorable and such a smiley little girl. Doing this course means that I will be able to help not only my family but also my community.

Attending TAFE to become a disability carer is great because everyone is nice to me and helps me if I get stuck. It's just so great to see how much everyone listens to you when you start talking about your feedback on a question. This causes everyone to share their thoughts on it. This is a very supportive learning environment where you don't feel ashamed to speak up. For TAFE we have to do 40 hours of work experience, and I decided to go to Orana. Orana provides employment training, housing, respite and life skills support to South Australians with disabilities. It was really good to see what type of things they do there. Employees seemed pretty happy during my work experience. One of our jobs was to put light switches together and it took me a few times to get it right but after a while I got it. This was a big achievement and I was glad to be part of a supportive group.

So far we have learnt how to walk around while being blindfolded and how to make a sandwich while being blindfolded. We had to go inside the elevator blindfolded, our partners and see what it feels like to not know where we're going then we had to eat some Smarties being blindfolded with a spoon and we couldn't see how many Smarties were in the spoon and sometimes it was funny because you'd pick up the spoon and put it in your mouth and there would be nothing in it. The purpose of these tasks wasto develop our understanding of vision impairment.

Sometimes it's hard because we have to do our courses and they're not all easy. Sometimes it's annoying because most of them involve, a lot of typing but the good thing is that everyone helps you out. Sometimes we do the courses together so that everyone can catch up. Some examples of course modules include

- Work legally and ethically
- Facilitate the empowerment of people with a disability
- Work with diverse people.

Doing this course has helped me gain skills I can use in my daily life as well as my future. I can move forward in my life as a positive member of the community. I strongly recommend students consider this as a pathway opportunity.
