FROM THE PRINCIPAL Dear Families

We are enjoying an eventful Term 3 with last week seeing Knock-Out Netball; the MASA Quiz Night; Debating Eisteddfod; the Careers Expo and the end of our Japanese student exchange all taking place. I continue to be amazed by the breadth of opportunities that are offered to our students and the enthusiasm with which they take these on.

Thank you to everyone who has given feedback about our Timetable Proposal. This has been largely very positive, but there are a few issues that we will need to clarify and communicate with the school community in the very near future before we commit completely to going ahead. This decision-making process will mean that Course Counselling will be a little more "fluid" this year, so please keep your eye out for communications about this in the coming weeks. In the meantime, very little will change for Year 11s going into Year 12, so we will manage that process first.

Teaching and classroom support staff partook in excellent Professional Learning on Monday, working with Kym Brown around Restorative Practices and how adopting these can support relationship building in schools, as well as support the development of powerful learners. His presentation was logical and clear and participants were very positive about what they learned for future use

Finally, it is with great excitement that we are able to announce the ongoing names for our five Communities. The SRC decided that the names would be Bunganditj (local Aboriginal language) names for animals; the students voted for their five favourites and then Community Leaders drew names from a hat.

The Cram Community is now known as Kurra (kangaroo); the Davey Community is Marma (stingray); the FLC is Nunkula (shark); the Pattenden Community is Kabir (emu) and the Praolini Community has become Kurang (snake). We look forward to further identity—building around these names and symbols in the future.

CLASSICAL STUDIES

Between the 1st and the 4th of August, eight students from Dr. Young's Year 12 Classical Studies class travelled to Melbourne, accompanied by Dr. Young and Lacey Burston, in order to view some of the important collections of Greek and Roman artefacts there. Over the course of two and half days, the students viewed three main collections. Firstly, they were able to examine the collection of priceless Syrian artefacts from Palmyra in the Ian Potter Museum of Art at the University of Melbourne. This collection is especially important given the threat that currently lies over all Syrian archaeological sites.

From there, the class travelled to the National Gallery of Victoria (International), where they were able to see an impressive range of Egyptian, Greek and Roman treasures. Finally, on the next day the group travelled to the Hellenic Museum, which contains an important collection on loan from the Benaki Museum in Athens, covering all periods of Greek history.

In addition, the students had several opportunities for shopping and were also able to go Ice skating one evening. All activities were enjoyed by all and were completed without mishap, and a tired but still enthusiastic group of students returned safely to Mount Gambier via V/Line train and coach on Friday afternoon. It is hoped that this trip will become an annual feature of the Year 12 History course at Grant High School.
