FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families

We have passed the halfway mark of the term in a flash as the school community continues to be involved in a number of activities and programs. One of these has been the consideration of a new timetable proposal. At Governing Council on 21st August, it was decided that the new timetable proposal has great merit and should be implemented; however, delaying this until 2019 was going to be optimal in supporting the school community through the change process. To that end, we will work through the upcoming Course Counselling period with students to ensure they are planning this year for a change in the following year. We will also share information with the school community on a regular basis to familiarize everyone on how the new timetable will work and what the impacts will be for students. Last week was big for hockey and soccer, with Knock-Out teams competing in finals series on Monday and Tuesday. On Wednesday, Year 11 students attended a SAPOL presentation and the whole week was dedicated to Book Week with a murder to solve; blind dates to be undertaken and a costume day occurring on Thursday. Life is certainly never dull!

Our NAPLaN results arrived last week and some areas for particularly around Writing. The number of students meeting the National Minimum Standard in all areas of testing, though, was considerably lower than last year and we will spend some time looking at both overall and individual results to identify where the work needs to be done to ensure students' continued success at school. On the positive side. 69% of students achieved mediumhigh level growth from the Year 7 tests to the Year 9 ones and 75% managed this in Numeracy, which is affirming of how we are supporting individual students in their development.


