Pangula Mannamurna Aboriginal Corporation (PMAC) provides a comprehensive range of health and wellbeing services to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people across the Limestone Coast.

Tackling Indigenous Smoking (TIS) is a new program. One of our key areas is children at school and talking to them about the benefits of not smoking, reducing smoking and/or quitting for themselves, friends and family.

We have two trained smoking cessation professionals that work within the TIS team, Kelly Anderson and Danielle Ashford. We are hoping to provide an informative and interactive session about Tobacco smoking, effects and support available at your school to any classes that may be interested and including any parents or homework classes.

Whilst we are focused on Indigenous Smoking particularly, all children are welcome to attend.

We are currently offering an incentive pack that includes some sports equipment and some books among other items for schools that book in for two information sessions in 2018, the dates can be anywhere in the 2018 year but must be booked prior to May 2018. The sessions run for approximately 45 minutes to 1 hour, we can alter the content and length to suit ages and understanding.

Year 8 Art

This term for Art with Miss Moretti our class studied Indigenous Perspectives, researching Australian animals and looking at the Tjanpi Desert Weavers. The Tjanpi Desert Weavers (Tjanpi meaning 'grass') shows the Aboriginals people's relationships with cultural significance to the land, which is why this art task is so important, as it uses locally found resources and materials. This task required us to pick and draw four Australian animals and their environments. From our four animals, we had to pick one to make into a Tjanpi Desert Weaver inspired sculpture. We learnt how to coil and how it is an ancient technique; one which has been used by Aboriginal women over generations to make reed and grass stalk mats and baskets. Tjanpi Desert Weavers use their works of art to connect with their traditional lands and dream stories, their art reflects on the Aboriginal values, belief and traditions. With the help of Katharine Watson, our class discovered our ideas and expanded on what we had already learnt about the Aboriginal Desert Weavers, showing some examples and photos from her personal experience of seeing artworks from these artists. All of us made many different animals like snakes, echidnas, fish, lizards, dingos and many more. For myself it was great to learn about Aboriginal culture and art making, and how they use the resources around them to make artworks. It was also great to learn about all the animals that we have living in Australia, including ones we didn't even know existed.


