FROM THE PRINCIPAL Dear Families

This has meant staff and students having to endure a much more cramped work environment in various parts of the school, but we are hopeful that the sacrifices we make now will be amply rewarded in a few months' time.

In the meantime, a brochure about our Building Better Schools project has gone live on the DECD website, outlining our hopes to build a new gym and create new purpose-built Performing Arts spaces over the coming years. This is another exciting opportunity to make sure our students have the best possible learning environments to support their schooling.

Last week's swimming events were hugely successful, with strong numbers attending our Inter-house carnival in perfect weather on Tuesday, and an outstanding result of finishing second at the Interschool Carnival on Friday. On Thursday and Friday of last week, I attended two conferences for school leaders in Adelaide, that outlined the Department for Education and Child Development's goals for our students' futures. On Tuesday 6th of February the Agriculture facility took delivery of 100 day old Isa Brown layer chickens.

Over the course of the first semester the three Year 9 Ag Practical classes, delivered by Meg Beck and Scott Cram, will care for the chickens. The intention is to raise the young layer birds with the sale of approximately 40 pallets (12 weeks old) in Term 2 and then 20 point of lay birds available at the end of the semester. The remaining 30-40 Layers will be kept as to refresh our own layer flock.


The SAASTA program supports Aboriginal students in Years 10-12 to complete school and explore and develop pathways into further study and employment, through learning and sharing about Aboriginal cultures, histories and perspectives. The Semester 1 highlight, and culmination of a significant part of the curriculum, is the Aboriginal Power Cup. This is a three day football carnival in June, where students showcase their learning through assessment tasks including design and cultural consultation, workshops, career and health expos and, of course being healthy and active on the field.

In the first session we talked about what SAASTA means, we played 2 truths and a lie to get to know each other and played a touch football scratch match.

In the second session we watched a documentary on Australian history, we got our new uniforms and got a photo taken to put in the Border Watch.

A large part of the future success of this program is due to the support of our local and wider community.
