Dear Families

We have passed the halfway point of the term and are looking forward now to Year 11 and 12 Exams; Year 10 Work Experience; the school social and “A Wild Winter’s Night” to round out the term. We have already enjoyed a number of knock-out sports outings and Outdoor Education camps, so it’s nice to see a different type of activity occurring to make sure the opportunities for our students are balanced across many areas.

Preliminary information from our External Review was very encouraging with no surprises as to the work that needs to be undertaken in the future for our school to improve: our classroom teaching methods need to provide greater flexibility, student voice and rigour in some areas; our improvement needs to be more data and evidence focused and supported and we need to continue to build on educational leadership to ensure classroom teachers are supported in these areas. Our work with Garry Costello addresses the last of these; we have constructed a Coordinator position to focus on how we use data to drive improvement and our classroom pedagogy work will always be ongoing.

We received excellent feedback on the work

that is going on in some classrooms, especially in the senior secondary years and the Homework Club is viewed as a huge positive by the school community; however, our Communities model and the work we are doing around wellbeing that was viewed as the most positive amongst the innovations that we have recently undertaken – likewise our work around the education of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.

There is much to celebrate and learn from as a result of the review and I extend the school’s appreciation to everyone who was involved in conversations with the reviewers. We look forward to seeing and publishing the official report to the school community.

Week 4, Friday night was a tropical blast!





RECONCILIATION WEEK

On Monday the 28th of May, the Student Representative Council led a Reconciliation event for the entire Year 8 cohort, with special guests Boandik Elders Aunty Michelle Jaqueline Furr and Uncle Ken Jones.

Australia has a long history of reconciliation and countless people – Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous – have dedicated their life's work to the reconciliation movement. As a result, many significant steps have been taken.

Reconciliation focuses on the relationship between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous Australians and opened up a national debate on prejudice, discrimination and racism. It has raised broader questions about our national identity and the place of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and rights in our nation's story.

The session involved a jigsaw learning process, where the whole group of Year 8s, staff and community met to discuss the topics and process before moving off in class groups to classrooms and completing activities about a key aspect of reconciliation. The group then reconvened to share their knowledge and understanding.

A massive thanks to the fabulous SRC, who facilitated the 2018 Year 8 Reconciliation event. We are very proud and grateful for your efforts, and feedback from Aunty Michelle and Uncle Ken was hugely positive. They were extremely impressed by the maturity, enthusiasm and exceptional manners of our students. Thank you :)

Reconciliation can no longer be seen as a single issue or agenda and the mainstream of reconciliation must weave all of these threads together. We have used resources from the educational branch of Reconciliation Australia, which is called Narragunnawali. Narragunnawali supports all schools and early learning services in Australia to develop environments that foster a higher level of knowledge and pride in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and contributions. Narragunnawali's online platform is free to access and provides practical ways to introduce meaningful reconciliation initiatives in the classroom, around the school and with the community. Through the Narragunnawali platform, Grant High School has developed a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), which we are in the process of reviewing and updating.
