FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families,

Welcome to Term 3, which will be very significant for our Year 12s, in particular, as they navigate their externally assessed assignments and exam preparation. This is where the rubber hits the road!

We enjoyed a vibrant start to the term, with our Year 8s involved in the Guitar Festival last Monday, and a select group of students attending a learning opportunity with worldrenowned educator, Yong Zhao. They were accompanied by a group of teachers and, together, will lead the school through a process to solve a significant problem. In this case, they will be working on ensuring there is authentic student voice and influence in the structure and delivery of the Personal Improvement Program (PIP) that occurs in Lesson 3 each Friday. We see massive potential in this concept, and it is fantastic that this group of students is committed to making it the cutting-edge innovation we envisaged it being. It is also great learning to see that it is OK not to get everything right the first time, and that persistence is important in achieving success - awesome values to apply to all aspects of life!

We are continuing negotiations around the new buildings that will enable to us to accommodate Year 7s. We hope that the final concept design will be completed within the next few weeks, so that we can start nutting out the detail. The scope of this build has meant that it is somewhat more complicated than the STEM project; however, we are patiently working our way through each step.

The downside of the new works is that other parts of the school start to look a little more careworn by comparison. We have replaced all tables and chairs on the Senior Floor to give those spaces a much-needed lift. and we methodically work our way through repainting those rooms, too. However, we are aware that our Wellbeing Centre will need expanding as Year 7s arrive, as will Home Economics, among other things. We are also aware that future projects will need to be self-funded - we have been very lucky in the past few years! As a result, we are re-establishing the school's Building Fund and we will need to expend some effort on fund-raising in the future. Please keep an eye out for any opportunities where you might be able to help with this.

Year 8 numbers for next year are sitting between 170 and 180 at this stage, leaving some room for further enrolments should the need arise.


From the early planning stages, to sourcing materials, designing artwork and turning pallets into abstract furniture, the students were involved in all processes that resulted in a quite amazing transformation.

FORENSIC SCIENCE WORKSHOP

On Tuesday 2 July, students from year 8 had the opportunity to participate in a forensic science workshop run by Education Interactive. Students engaged in the investigation titled 'A Case of Conspiracy.' The case focused on an 18-year-old boy who had been arrested for a murder which he claimed to know nothing about. However, drugs, a gun and a stash of money were found at the home of the accused which all pointed to his guilt.

After being briefed on the case, students began examining evidence using eight different techniques that included tyre tread impressions, blood detection, DNA profiling, autopsy reports, digital evidence, ballistics, arson investigation, digital microscopy, Micros-Pectrophotometry (MSP) Data Comparison and fingerprint & handwriting analysis.

The students worked collaboratively when analysing the evidence to determine timelines and uncover the motives of the suspects. Whilst being an engaging science experience for students, the undertone to the storyline covered serious social and community issues, with the case highlighting drug awareness and the impacts of being involved with the wrong crowd. It was a fantastic event for our students to be involved in!








STAGE 1 WORKPLACE PRACTISES

YONG ZHAO WORKSHOP


Grant High School was a successful applicant into the Yong Zhao Network for schools. It is an amazing opportunity to work with one of the worlds leading educational leaders.






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
