FROM THE PRINCIPAL Dear Families.

2019 was once again action-packed with the adoption of a new timetable and all the adjustment that comes with such a significant change. We have enjoyed being able to eat at an earlier break time and the symmetry of the week, with each day being organized in the same fashion, helps with our routines.

Unfortunately, we did not get homegroup and the Personal Improvement Program right this year, but we know that change is an evolutionary process and, in fact, getting the PIP wrong provided us with an excellent opportunity for learning. Working with Professor Yong Zhao, a world-class educator in the entrepreneurial realm, has afforded a group of our students the chance to effect significant change in our school for next year. They have undertaken an extensive process to re-write the PIP in line with student feedback around their wants and needs, and we look forward to how that program rolls out in 2020.

The Homegroup program is also undergoing a significant make-over as we speak, including a new name, so that it is much more responsive to the needs of individual students, their wellbeing and plans for the future. We anticipate parents and caregivers being more involved in their young people's decisionmaking with this new iteration of pastoral care. As has been the case for the past four and a half years, every change we make is geared towards our mission of building futureready citizens. Nothing we do is meant to just fill time or tick a box – we are mindful that what we offer must be relevant and authentic in order not to waste anyone's time.

While we did not get these two things quite right, 2019 saw, in my opinion, the coming together of the best teaching staff we have had

at Grant High School during my association with the school - since 1993, that is. This has been a combination of excellent recruiting strategies and sheer luck. I have spent two days each week for the majority of the year observing classes and the quality of pedagogy, the evidence of learning and the positive relationships developing between staff and students has been a joy to witness.

I have been thrilled to see the benefits of our Community model becoming more evident as time progresses. The connections our Community Leaders and Managers have with their community members has led to much clearer decision around students' subject choices and career pathways. I have been especially pleased with our attention to ensuring students can leave Grant High School with an apprenticeship at the end of Year 11, still able to complete their SACE because our planning around Research Project, in particular, has been much better informed and strategic.

Usually at this time of year, we say goodbye to a number of staff and this year is no exception - only the number is very small. I take this opportunity to thank those who are moving on from Grant for their commitment to our community and wish them all the very best for the future. We say a special farewell to Steve Hall, our fabulous Chemistry teacher, who has been at Grant High School for a very long time since 1992, I believe. His service to the school and its students has been exemplary and he will be sorely missed.

Finally, I take this opportunity to wish you all the blessings of the holiday season as we look forward to a wonderful 2020 together.

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BELETA SWAMP EXCURSION

Jack Opolski's year 9 Science class went on a trial excursion to Beleta (Mount Burr) Swamp on the 13th of November. In the week before the excursion we had a classroom visit from NGT Senior Ecologist Bryan Haywood and the Program Coordinator of Education on NGT Reserves, Nicole Mojonnier. They brought in resources, spoke about the change in landscape since settlement and ran a water bug identification activity.

Nature Glenelg Trust run The Mount Burr Swamp Restoration Reserve, which is a partially grazed property with a large number of wetlands in varying condition states. In 2016, drainage from Mount Burr Swamp was temporarily filled in and the swamp is now able to retain



more water over spring-summer. This has had a significant impact on many plant and animal species, including the endangered growling grass frog (which was heard calling during our recent visit). The students also learned about how the site is very significant to the local Boandik people.



The excursion focus to Mt Burr Swamp was to carry out three methods of assessing the health of wetlands/waterbodies in three wetlands;

- a visual assessment of wetland condition using a locally prepared field guide,
- use a water quality probe to measure various water quality parameters, and
- to capture, identify and count macro-invertebrates (waterbugs) using sweep nets.

On the excursion, NGT provided worksheets for the students to complete assessing the health of each wetland. Students were split into groups of three, with one student recording the data for each wetland. The class enjoyed discovering a variety of water bugs and exploring and learning about wetlands. Come next year, they will plant the seeds to grow tree saplings that will then be planted for the cockatoos.







GRANT HIGH YARNING CIRCLE

Yarning Places are spaces where people can connect with culture, community and Country in a learning environment. They are important places in providing area for open dialogue and communication in a culturally respectful way. In 2018 we first started talking about creating a Yarning Place for Grant High. Josh Praolini and his Outdoor Studies class first started the process by designing the area and took on the hard work of digging up the area and laying out the rocks etc. Then Rob took pity on them and brought his Kanga in, which made much quicker work of it!

In 2019 our fabulous Nunkula community took it over with students working with Local Elders and finished constructing our Yarning Place. Students from other communities were also integral parts to this as well.

The Yarning Place is somewhere staff and students can access hands on learning experiences and cultural knowledge. It is a place of many uses to sit and talk, with students and parents/caregivers and wider community. The space features Indigenous plants, a fire pit, seating circle and a seasonal creek bed, which will enable students to develop their cultural knowledge and

appreciation across all learning areas.

A big thank you to a number of businesses and people who donated materials and their time including GEMS, Roundwood Solutions, Rob Berlin, Matt Duncan and Sarah. Others who helped find the native plants include Native Plant Wholesalers and Mimosa Trees. Huge thanks to Uncle Doug Nicholls and Kathy Bell for providing cultural support and instruction in Yarning Places. Also to Aunty Michelle for doing our Welcome to Country.

To all the students who helped create this from design to construction, thank you. The Yarning Place was always meant to be created by you, for you. To have a place for students now and in the future to engage in cultural experiences and learning here at Grant is a precious gift that you have given your school and community. Be proud.


