Dear Families

The term is rapidly drawing to a close and students are working hard on final assessments to ensure their reports reflect their best efforts this semester, in spite of COVID-induced disruptions.

We have been fortunate that staff infections have continued to occur in a trickle, rather than a rush, as this has meant that we have been able to run most classes as we normally would. We appreciate students' cooperation during those times we have combined classes and we are thankful that we have not had to cancel any extra-curricular activities so far. This is largely due to the lateral thinking of our Daily Organisation Team as well as the goodwill of teachers who continue to go above and beyond what is necessary to meet the needs of our students.

Our Student Free Day last Friday allowed us to focus time and energy on planning to help students improve their reading and comprehension in all areas of learning at every year level. We specifically learned about the value of focusing on the acquisition of Tier 2 language – more sophisticated, formal language than we use when speaking (Tier 1) that can be employed in many situations, as opposed to Tier 3 language which is technical terminology that is very subject-specific. We also learned strategic ways to help young people infer information from a variety of texts. We hope that the extra long weekend was useful for our families at this cold and wet time of year.

Staffing continues to be a challenge for us, given the teacher shortage across the country, and we have had to rationalize some classes for next semester to ensure we have everything covered. We thank students and their families for their patience with these processes – the timetable is very nearly set now, with a few minor tweaks still to occur. Given this shortage, we were very pleased to be able to welcome Patrick Rudd to the school, teaching Mathematics and HPE for the remainder of the year and we thank Ellen Masters very much for covering Betty Bai's classes for the majority of this term.

Finally, a reminder that the 2022 musical – Musical, She Wrote – will be performed at the Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre in Week 9. We hope to see many of you there to witness the amazing talent of our young people.

In the meantime, we hope you stay well and warm.

With several late exclusions to the team, the Open Boys Hockey team faced a tough challenge heading to Adelaide for the State Hockey Championships. Ultimately, a challenge the group were well-and-truly up for.

Captain, Connor Millhouse, followed this shortly after with a beautiful backstick goal to lead Nuriootpa 2-0. Player of the match, Nash Lobley finished the game with a further two goals - to start the day with a 4-0 victory.

Game 2 saw us up against a strengthened St. Peter's outfit - fielding a particularly strong midfield. Although Blake McKee and youngster, Pattrick Robinson, held their own in the midfield for Grant, we were unable to convert a large number of attacking entries. St. Peter's were composed in their attacking half and some clean finishes saw them take the game 3-0.

The game against Henley saw our defenders step up to shut down the run of their opposition. Tim Kuchel and Fletcher Barry played their roles superbly to deny their direct opponents time on the ball. Jack Leishman was solid at fullback - and played some exceptional overhead passes to generate attacking runs. The group were unlucky to concede a late goal, going down 1-0.

Our last game, against the 2021 State Champions, P.A.C., was an exceptional battle that could have gone either way. Millhouse put us on the scoreboard with a beautiful drag flick to the top left. 2-1 down, the Grant boys won a penalty corner with seconds remaining on the clock. Unfortunately, Will Cameron, after an exceptional game, narrowly missed the shot.

The group are to be exceptionally proud of their efforts. Although he didn't quite have the dance moves of Andrew Redmayne, Shaunn Robinson's keeping skills were, once again, elite - thanks Shaunn for taking on this position. In particular, I'd like to thank the seven junior players who stepped up to make-up our open team. The fact that we were neck-and-neck against some outstanding competition is a credit to how well these players contributed to the group.

The score was 17-3 at half time, giving us a comfortable lead. The boys continued their hard work in the second half to secure a 23 point win. Lachlan was the top point scorer for the game with 9, followed by Nelson and Ben who scored 7 each. In the second match we played Naracoorte HS, who were a very fine-tuned side. For most of the first half it was goal for goal and despite the boys best efforts, we were down 12-15 at half time. Strong defensive efforts and accurate shooting in the second half swung the game in our favour with a final score of 23-17. Ben lead to goal scoring with 12, followed by Brydon with 6. Our final game was a playoff again Millicent HS to see who would be advancing to the state finals in Adelaide. We started the game off slowly allowing Millicent to secure the lead at half time, with a score of 18-13. With this their confidence grew and they displayed some outstanding passages of play secure a hard fought, 4-point victory.
