

Ashlynn Wagner from MAS Careers provided ongoing support to Stage 2 Work Ready students throughout Term 1. Undertaking several targeted workshops, including MAS Careers Services, Resume and Cover Letter Development, Employer Expectations and Interview Skills, students developed knowledge and skills in work readiness, employer expectations and the tailoring of employment applications to specific roles. Students were also offered the opportunity to complete a Harrison Career Assessment and 1:1 consultation with Ashlynn to develop a personalized Career Action Plan.




Forestry Careers Talk

On the 9th March, we welcomed **Green Triangle Forestry's Workforce Development Manager**, **Josh Praolini** as a guest speaker at the ILC. Josh facilitated a detailed an interactive presentation on the 3 pillars of the Forestry Industry: Forest Management and Silviculture, Harvest Haulage and Port Operations, and Milling and Wood Products.

After gaining a broad understanding of the Forestry Industry, students were given the opportunity to clarify their understanding of employment conditions, earning potential and most importantly, how to apply for work. The exploration of careers in forestry continues in Term 2, including Forestry Immersion opportunities: Girls in Trucks simulator, mill tours and work experience.

Community Garden

In the garden, students spent Term 1 harvesting the summer crop and preparing the garden beds for winter planting. Students were fortunate to attend a workshop with Bunnings gardening specialists Hannah and Liz sharing their knowledge in soil preparation, natural pest control and plant selection. Bunnings generously donated seeds and seedlings for our winter crop. Patto's plots produced an abundance of Jerusalem artichokes, garlic, onions, silver beet and beetroot which, in a true paddock to plate experience, CAFÉ ILC students used to create a delicious Roast Vegetable Salad.
