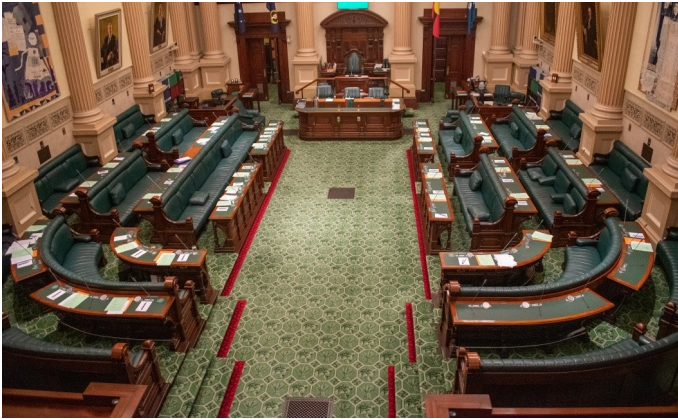
LEGAL STUDIES CAMP

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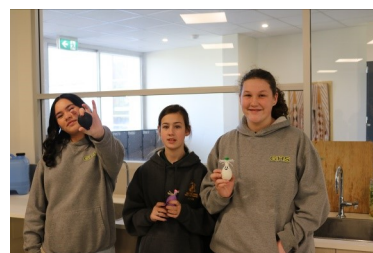
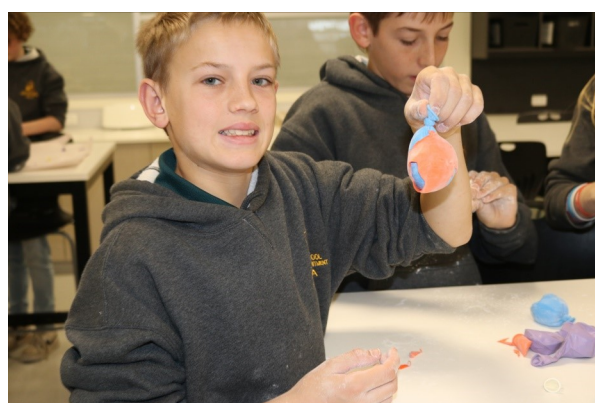
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YEAR 7 HEALTH AND POSITIVE MINDS—STRESS BALL MAKING
