Students and Families,

Enjoy this jam-packed newsletter, it contains very important information regarding end of year arrangements and showcases all the wonderful experiences ILC students have participated in this term.

SACE Deadlines

Term 4 is notoriously busy, with SACE resulting and end of year preparations. While we aim to be as flexible and inclusive as possible throughout the year, there are non-negotiable SACE deadlines that students must meet to ensure that teachers can mark, grade and result student work. We appreciate your ongoing support in ensuring students are attending regularly, completing set work and catching up where required.

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of those Stage 2 students who have worked hard to get their final reflections completed. For those still working to finish, reflections must be submitted by Friday of week 10 in order to be resulted this year.



Work on Contracts and Folio's will continue in the first half of next term, due at the end of week 4.

Flexible Industry Pathways / VET

Any students interested in undertaking VET courses in 2024 (Cert II or III qualifications), are encouraged to speak with their case managers before the end of term. Students need to meet eligibility criteria through industry exposure, such as employment, work experience or industry immersion in the area they are looking to study in. Referral into VET courses closes mid-term 4.

Community Learning Interviews

Students that have undertaken self-directed community learning activities, in areas such as community development, independent living, self development or work skills and career development, can apply for recognition at Stage 1 by undertaking an interview with our teachers. These will take place in week 8 of Term 4, case managers will contact eligible students to arrange an interview time.

Students exiting the ILC in 2023 will be supported by case managers in their transition from school. Guided by the development of transition goals, students will be encouraged to apply for work, further study or be referred to employment providers.

Students and families should be proactive in developing these goals with case managers so that we can adequately support you during this time.

Caregivers of **students continuing next year** will be provided with the 2024 FLO Consent Form. This form secures your child's enrolment with us, please return it to ILC Admin staff prior to the end of year.

Families are invited to visit the ILC during school hours until the end of term, to view the exhibition and provide feedback to students on their images.




Image: Dom's entry into the One Forty One Forest Photo Competition

Forest Photo Competition Exhibition 2023

The Riddoch Art Gallery & Mt Gambier Airport

Twelve of the (hundreds!) of entries into the One Forty One Forest Photo Competition have been selected for exhibition. Congratulations to Dom, whose image was selected as one of the prestigious twelve!

Images are currently on display at the Riddoch Art Gallery until the 27th of September, in the Southlink Space facing the Cave Garden and can be viewed from outside when walking past. The exhibition then moves on to the Mount Gambier Airport.



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ILC Anglers

Earlier in the term, Anglers students took part in a unique cultural experience on Gunditjmara Country at the UNESCO World Heritage Site, **Budj Bim National Park**.

On a guided tour, students explored ancient aquaculture systems, eel traps, lava flows and the remnants of Aboriginal stone houses, finishing the day sharing a platter of assorted eel produce at the Tae Rak Aquaculture Centre.

Students (and staff!) were fascinated to learn about the eel life cycle and meet researchers that were attempting to capture eels as they migrated back to the Lake Condah from tropical oceans.



In week 5, Anglers students visited the **Beachport Museum** to learn about the area's rich fishing and agricultural history, including whaling practices dating back to the 1800's. The museum exhibits replica living quarters, information on the region's Aboriginal history, fossilised shells and crustaceans, fishing, agricultural and communication equipment including a telephone switchboard, wool press, tractors and cray pots. Students were captivated by the whaling history in Beachport and the items on display, especially the caldrons and enormous whale bones.



Artopia

Students created a series of linocut pieces this term. Linocut or lino printing is a printmaking technique in which a sheet of lino is used as a relief surface. Students etched their designs into the linoleum surface using a chisel, with the uncarved areas representing a mirror image of the design in print. Students inked the surface of their designs with a roller, and then pressed them onto paper before creating their own tote bags, with one student opting to extend their design to incorporate water colour.



Wear It Purple Day


On August 25th, students and staff celebrated "Wear It Purple Day".

Community Garden

Holla Fresh Industry Immersion:

Community Garden students toured the Holla Fresh facility in Tantanoola this term, exploring career pathways in horticulture. The tour took students through the commercial growing process from seed to supermarket. Students learnt about the difference between hydroponic and soil growing practices, controlled versus non-controlled greenhouses, natural pest control, quality assurance, packing and transport. Holla Fresh employ up to 60 staff locally and supply approximately 60% of SA/NT supermarkets. Students were fascinated to learn about Holla Fresh's approach to limiting the use of chemicals, which included the growth of chilli plants and distribution of natural bugs (wasps and moths) that consume harmful pests.



Heavy Vehicle Simulator Excursion

Students were invited to experience a virtual heavy vehicle simulator on Tuesday 19th September at Grant High School. Students enjoyed the virtual exposure to driving a large, heavy vehicle. They were able to look at their performance including their acceleration, revs per minute, gears used and overall performance.




Meals are available every Monday and Wednesday night from 6:00-6:30pm.
